All Scouts must be prepared to teach the following:

Saturday AM

1. Knots: (Arrow of Light Part of #2, Outdoorsman #11 & #10) -Square Knot, Whip and Fuse ends of a rope, 2 half hitches, & taut-line hitch

Saturday PM

- 2. Outdoor Fire Safety: (Outdoorsman #7) Using rules, show how to build a safe fire and put it out; including homemade fire starters
- 3. Cooking basics: (Outdoorsman #8) How to prepare, cook, & clean-up
- 4. Campfire Activity How to's: (Outdoorsman #2) Different ideas, skits, songs, & why is campfire important to scouts and camping.

Star and Life Scouts should indicate which areas below they would like to teach by indicating a 1st, 2nd, and 3rd choice on the registration form on the reverse but should be well versed in all classes in case they need to fill in

Boy Scouts will be teaching each session, approximately 20 minutes each

- 1. Leave No Trace: (Outdoorsman #5, Naturalist #12, & Possible Belt Loop Wildlife Conservation) Guidelines, Poster, & Practice
- 2. Overnight Campout Prep: (Outdoorsman #1) How to Pack & Plan for anything when going on a campout with boy scouts.
- 3. Blind Triangle: Team building game to build communication skills and teamwork
- 4. Courage: (Readyman #1) What is courage and why do you need it when an emergency situation occurs. Be Strong, Be Calm, Be Clear, & Be Careful
- 5. First Aid Basics: (Readyman #2, 3, & 12) What is First Aid? How should you act after an accident? How do you use all the items in a first aid kit. "helplist" Who to call.
- 6. Human Knot: Team building game to build communication skills and teamwork
- 7. Serious Business: (Readyman #4 & 5) Heimlich Maneuver, Choking, Serious Bleeding, Stopped Bleeding, Internal Poisoning, Heart Attack, Poisonous Snakes
- 8. Minor Medical (Readyman#7) Cuts & Scratches, Burns & Scalds, Blisters on Hands & Foot, Tick bites, Bites & Stings from other bugs, Nose Bleed, Frostbite, and Sunburn
- 9. 1st Aid Baseball: designed to test skills and knowledge on 1st Aid.
- 10. Safety: (Readyman #9 & 14) Bike and Car 6 safety Rules. Walking and hiking near roadways
- 11. Safe Swim & Shock: (Readyman #6 & 8)
- 12. Field Games (tug of war, steal the bacon, etc)

NOTES ON CAMPING AND APPROPRIATE LEADERSHIP

- A Webelos Scout may participate in overnight den camping (WHICH IS WHAT THIS EVENT IS, IF YOU ARE NOT CAMPING WITH A TROOP) when supervised by an adult. In most cases, the Webelos Scout will be under the supervision of his parent or guardian along with their Webelos Leader. It is essential that each Webelos Scout be under the supervision of a parent-approved adult if the parent can't attend.
- Joint Webelos den/troop campouts including the parents of the Webelos Scouts are encouraged to strengthen ties between the pack and troop (WHICH IS WHAT THIS EVENT IS, IF YOU ARE CAMPING WITH A TROOP).
- If you are camping as a Webelos Den, the Webelos Leader with your group must have completed Outdoor Leader Training for Webelos. This training is being offered October 12-13 if you do not already have it. Parents attending need to take Youth Protection Training prior to going as well. Information will be available as we get closer to the training.
- If you are camping with a Troop, a Scout leader attending must have completed Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills. Parents attending need to take Youth Protection Training prior to going as well.
- Two-deep leadership is required at all times per BSA policy.
- It is not the intention of the Trail to Eagle (Star and Life Scouts) for the Scouts to attend on their own, rather attend with their Troop as a modified troop outing. Other members from the troop can attend but Scout leaders should have planned program for them for the duration of the weekend and not allow it to be a free-for-all with Scouts running amuck.

 Program is not being provided for Boy Scouts with ranks lower than Star. Food will be provided as it is for the participants (for certain meals) since the younger Scouts will be paying the same registration cost as the Scouts attending for the Trail to Eagle program.
- Tigers, Wolfs, and Bears are not allowed to attend this event.

Rules and Regulations for Event

- 1. No fireworks or pets allowed.
- 2. No glass bottles allowed.
- 3. Please follow posted signs. Driving directions will also be outlined on the map.
- 4. Please have money included with registration form.
- 5. Please do not leave camp until you have completed a Closing Evaluation, been checked and signed off for your campsite being cleaned, and have received your patches.

Unit Packing List (to include but is not limited to)

- Trash Bags (you will pack your trash out)

How to Make a Foil Pack Meal Addendum

Equipment

- Heavy duty aluminum foil
- Charcoal fire charcoal should be in a single layer

Instructions

- 1. Tear off a piece of foil about four times the size of the food you want to cook.
- 2. Fold the foil in half.
- 3. Place the food in the middle of the foil.
- 4. Bring the opposite sides of the foil together.
- 5. Fold the sides over, one half inch at a time, crimping the foil together as you go.
- 6. Fold the open edges toward the center, crimping together.
- 7. Place the foil packet on the charcoal
- 8. Cook until packet puffs up with steam usually about 30 to 45 minutes.
- 9. Open carefully! You don't want a steam burn.

When sealing up the foil, the idea is to form an airtight seal, so the steam can't escape. If the steam gets out, you might scorch your food. You are essentially making a small pressure cooker. If you are not using heavy duty foil, use two pieces of foil to make a double layer. You don't want your dinner to end up in the fire.

What to expect:

Prior to Friday

Webelos should work with their den and leader/parents to complete Traveler Activity Badge Requirements 3-5 and 7-11. This will allow the webelos to plan the trip to Roaring River for this event and earn the activity badge.

Friday

Webelos and Leaders:

For those units that choose to come down on Friday night, there is no benefit to doing so other than not having to rally and drive first thing in the morning on Saturday. There is no programming on Friday night or food being provided. Our suggestion is to start to discuss the Patrol Method with your boys and begin to set up duty rosters for the weekend. You can also plan to cover different advancements that the Webelos should be working on. Event staff will likely be at Crowder College for the Trail to Eagle program.

For Star and Life Scouts and Leaders:

Your program IS Friday night. You need to be on site by 7 PM to get camp set up and then meet at Crowder College, specific location will be determined closer to the event for your Trail to Eagle Program by 8 PM. This program will give you all of the necessary training and tools needed to earn your Eagle. After that portion of the program we will be discussing Saturday's program for the Webelos. Upon registering for this event you choose what areas you would like to teach. We will do our best to accommodate those. Depending on how many Boy Scouts we have attending will determine the set up for Saturday. Leading Saturday's program for the Webelos will count as your 6 hours of a service project for either Star or Life rank as long as you get your Scoutmasters approval. That is what it is designed to do. You MUST GET YOUR SCOUTMASTERS APPROVAL FOR IT TO COUNT.

Option A) Some Boy Scouts will be assigned to teach a specific session while other Boy Scouts are assigned to each group and will rotate with their group for the day as helpers.

Option B) We will just assign Boy Scouts to groups and you will work with your group to cover all of the material needed for each session with the help of the leaders in that group

Option C) We are not sure what Option C is, but "Be Prepared).

The key to this program is for you to provide leadership to the Webelos, giving them a taste of what Boy Scouting is and the skills you use as a Boy Scout.

Saturday

Check in for those that did not camp on Saturday is 8 AM. Once checked in, you will have time to set up camp and be ready for the opening ceremony at 9:30 AM. There will be time later in the day to do what you did not have time for in the morning.

Program begins at 9:30 AM and will end after campfire. There will be an hour for lunch (provided for all to save time). Don't forget you mess kits, no paper products are being provided. If you don't bring a cup, you don't drink. If you don't have a plate your chips go in your pocket...don't have pockets, they go in your socks. © The program is designed for the Webelos to earn their Outdoorsman and Readyman Activity Badge along with some Boy Scout skills along the way and some awesome team building activities.

Remember: We will be having Boy Scouts leading these program areas. Adult support will more than likely be necessary but please let the boys teach and support them. Adult leaders taking over is not the intent! These are not green Scouts, these are boys that have achieved either Star or Life rank and are working towards their Eagle. They need to be able to teach younger Scouts and have the support from the adults in your group.

Saturday continued

Around 4 PM you will head back to your camp to get fires started for dinner. This will be a part of the program, so this is the webelos starting the fires, not the leaders. Boy Scouts will be on hand to run this portion of the program. This is also the time to finish setting up camp if you ran out of time in the morning.

Once the fires are started or simultaneously dinner preparation can begin. There is an addendum for foil packs in this packet for those leaders that may not know how to prepare a foil pack meal. By 6:40 meals need to be prepared, eaten, and cleaned up so that we can begin closing campfire promptly at 7 PM. Boy Scouts are to be leading the program from 4 PM-7PM with help and assistance from adults.

After campfire there is no designed program; Scouts can hang out until lights out at 11.

Sunday

Breakfast at 7 AM, provided for all youth and adults. We will have religious services at 8 AM potential programming until 10. Check out will ensue at 10 AM to include breaking down camp, program surveys, cleaning up campsite, receiving patches, and departing unless your unit makes the decision to leave on Saturday.

This is the plan as it is prepared on July 13th. Things may change between now and November. Any significant changes will be communicated via email, website, and hard copy.
